-back in production

Gage Marine is once again in the business of selling wooden boats with the introduction of the "Tradition 26", christened and launched July 1, 2007.



The Honduran mahogany cold molded hull is built by Van Dam with a beautiful African mahogany interior. Some of the features include two coolers, one with it's own bilge pump for melted ice water, a motor box which opens up to a sunning platform, dark covering boards, wooden banjo wheel, oiled mahogany lattice floor, swept back wooden windshield framing, and vinyl upholstery feeling as if it were fine suede.

The new 26' Gage-Hacker utilizes the John Hacker Maierform design bottom (see the Classic Boating article page 16 in the May/June 2007 issue) giving it a very good ride in the typical Geneva Lake chop. A small section turned downward at the chine also gives an exceptionally dry ride. The lines are classic, especially the curved plumb transom.

GENEVA LAKES 2007 SCHEDULE OF EVENTS DESCRIPTION

NEW EVENTS FOR FRIDAY! We'll board the steam-powered Louise (1902), an all-weather historic day launch and arrive at Black Point Mansion for a private tour. Built in 1888 in the Queen Ann style, the museum has 13 bedrooms and features a 4 story crow's nest, which served as an observation tower to the panoramic views of Geneva Lake. This private viewing is available via this launch only. The property is on 6 acres with 600 feet of shoreline, with a fair amount of steep steps up to the Mansion. Meet at the Abbey Launch Ramp for check-in prior to a short walk to the Fontana Pier where we will board the launch. Cash beverages will be available aboard. After the tour the launch will take us to Gage Marine for lunch. Approx 2:15 the launch will return us to the Fontana Pier.



The remainder of the afternoon is open, allowing you for you to launch your boat and see more of the lakeshore, antique in nearby Walworth (10 min drive), or check out the shops of Lk Geneva on the east end of the lake (20 min drive).

The Friday evening Cocktail/ Hors d'oeurvres Reception 6:00. Wisconsin cheeses, wings, meatballs, & calamari will be among the offerings, there will be a cash bar and a special appearance by nautically-themed Capt. Crooner (www.captaincrooner.com)! Our private room at Gordy's Lakeside Restaurant, a short 2 block walk from the Abbey, has a classic nautical theme overlooking Geneva Lake.



Friday launching is available from 7:00-9:00 AM till the Tour, or 2:00-8:00 PM.

Show day packet & launching assignments will be available 7-9:30 Saturday at Abbey's Harbor House near the ramp. Launching is at the same time. Come in and pick-up your dock assignment before driving up to the ramp. A complimentary continental breakfast for boat registrants is available here until 10am.

Seventy+ in-water and many on-land antique, classic and current contemporary wood boats from the early 1900's on up highlight this Show. The public attends free.

The **4pm Boat Parade** allows another opportunity to get out onto one of Wisconsin's largest and deepest lakes, enjoying the fall scenery. If taking your boat be sure to attend the Skippers meeting @ 3:30 in the Show Tent.

Saturday's Cocktail Party and Dinner will be held at the Abbey. Bill Gage Jr, from Gage Marine will discuss the history of Gage/Hacker boatbuilding and the reintroduction of the line!

Sunday morning have a leisurely breakfast or go boating, but be sure to attend the Show by 10am. At 1:00 the **Awards Ceremony** will take place. Also on Sunday there will be hundreds of classic cars on display at the Interlaken Resort nearby.

There is a choice of engines up to 300 HP coupled to a V-drive through a reduction gear. The drive train is smooth and the engine muffled so that conversation in the rear seat is not a strain.

The attitude of the hull accelerating from idle to on-plane was a pleasant surprise. Because of the Hacker design bottom there is almost no rise of the bow in the transition from slow to planning speeds, visibility over the bow is good at all speeds.

Bill Gage Jr will be speaking more about this project at the Saturday night dinner during the Geneva Lake Boat Show. TRADITION 26

Rather than a replica of one particular model, the Colemans chose to combine features they liked from several models of the era. Much of the hardware is original Ditchburn, some it reproduction, but all of the hardware, interior, wiring, accessories,



quadrant steering and rudder are true to Ditchburn of the era. The wood streering wheel is a restored wheel from the 1920's, and the engine is a restored Chrysler straight 8.

This is truly a magnificent craft, if you want to see what dreams are made of, it will be at the Geneva Lake Boat Show.

"Byrne Pile"

Restoration of a 1953 Resorter By Matt Byrne

It all began when I was finishing up the restoration of my 1962 19' Century Resorter. I had an issue with the engine that a local mechanic was looking into, and when I went to pick up the boat he asked if I was interested in doing another one. My first reaction was "absolutely not"! I had just finished up an arduous 4 year project and was ready to enjoy using a boat rather than working on one. The mechanic continued on and said that his brother had a Century wooden boat, wasn't sure what model, and he was going to burn the hull in the near future. He went on to say that, if I wanted it, his brother would give it to me for free. This got my attention. "You should at least go look at it" he said. I agreed and the next weekend I went to take a look.



Upon arrival I found a 1953 16' Resorter, stripped of all hardware, upside down on a burn pile with a few bottom board removed. After a little investigation I discovered the following: The guy that owned the boat acquired it as a bonus when purchasing a different boat. The boat had been retrofitted with a V-8 at one time and this was too much power for its modest hull. When the boat began leaking due to the extra power the owner decided to fiberglass the hull. Well, the fiberglass only lasted a season or two and the boat began leaking again. At this point the owner stripped the hull of the fiberglass and removed a couple of bottom planks. He discovered just how poor of shape the boat was in and he threw in the towel. The current owner attempted to sell the boat. It was listed in an old issue of the

Thoroughbred (I found the issue - shame on you guys for not buying the boat then!). After failing to sell and getting tired of paying for storage, the owner decided to destroy the hull and sell the hardware. This is where I enter the picture. For \$300 I had

an old trailer from the guy storing the boat, some hardware and a major project on my hands. After taking inventory I found that I was missing the steering wheel, windshield brackets, rub rail, and an engine. It was time to start searching eBay on a regular basis.

A couple weeks later I went back out to the burn pile, put the boat on a trailer, and the owner of the land agreed to store the boat for me until spring. In the spring of 2002 I brought the boat home and began the work. This boat was in the worst shape possible. It was like a big piece of jello, very loose. After a lot of bracing I flipped it over and began removing the bottom. I was amazed at how many screws, bolts, and frames were broken. And, yes, the keel was broken from the over powering of the V-8. All the broken material made it difficult to even use some pieces at patterns. It's funny, whenever I show someone a project like this they say "how do you know how to do this?". I say, "It's easy! You just take a piece off, make a new one, and then put it back on". This is what I did for the next 4 years until the boat was completely reframed and re-planked. The only original wood is the 2 engine stringers and the back seat bottom. Everything else is new wood. Finally, in summer of 2006, I was done with woodworking for the hull and began applying the finish. After hours of sanding, some above normal temps, and many coats of varnish, the hull had a shiny finish by the end of 2006. Since then I've installed chrome hardware, plumbed the gas tank and ran the electrical. My target date to finish was May 19, 2007, for a boat show in Muscatine, Ia. I met that



deadline just in the nick of time. The boat hit the water for the first time the day before the show, it made its debut with no issues, and it hasn't seen the water since. We do plan to hit a few boat shows this fall, including the Geneva Lakes Boat Show in September. I decided to name the boat "Byrne Pile", a play on where I found the boat and my last name.

Lessons learned: 1) When picking a restoration project, find a boat that is complete. Missing parts can be hard to find and are usually expensive. 2) A little experience is sometimes a bad thing. This is the second boat I've restored so I figured I knew what I was doing...I may have rushed a few things. This rushing came back to haunt me later. 3) No matter how long you think something will take to do, double it! 4) Try to stay motivated. There was a period in my restoration where I didn't do any work for almost a year. I always find that visiting a boat show or two will help get me ready to tackle the next problem. 4) Have fun. Don't make working of the boat a chore or you will never finish.















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
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
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







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
