
Annual Father's Day Port Edwards Champagne Brunch & Fox River Cruise Sunday June 18

The awards ceremony on Sunday serves as the show's finale. -- The Minocqua Antique & Classic Wooden Boat Show benefits the Multiple Sclerosis Society. 2nd Annual Eagle River Antique & Classic Boat Show June 16-18, 2006

You are invited to take part in the second annual Eagle River event for owners of antique and classic wooden boats! The famous Eagle River chain of 28 lakes will be the site for the show scheduled for June 16, 17 and 18, 2006. The event will be held on the grounds of the Wild Eagle Lodge on Duck Lake. The location is unique and simply outstanding for the public and boat owners. Brand new docks, beautiful grounds and special activities, including a special exhibitor rate for those who wish to stay on the grounds, are available. There is ample free parking, free storage for trailers and assisted launching at the Wild Eagle Lodge. Security will be provided at night for your exhibits.

Most important is the fact that all proceeds from this event will go to the area's Special Olympics program.

Plans include a Friday evening tour on a section of the Chain of Lakes and a ride on a large replica of a "pirate ship" to the famous Chanticleer Inn for cocktails and dinner. Saturday afternoon will provide an optional boat tour of the Eagle River Chain of Lakes followed by a catered dinner, entertainment and socialization at the Boondockers Lounge at the Wild Eagle Lodge. Awards for boats in several categories include a "popular selection" by the public, "owners' selections" for best Chris Craft (two or more divisions), best non-Chris Craft (two or more divisions), best outboard motor boat, best non-motor boat, and best of show. Also new this year will be a limited number of local boat dealer displays, and expanded display area.

Please return your application as soon as possible as slips and display locations will be assigned as completed forms are obtained. If you wish, include a brief history of your boat and a reproducible photograph to enhance area publicity in various ways.

The attached schedule and reservation form should help to answer any of your questions. If you need any additional information, please feel free to contact Jo Daniel, the on-site coordinator for the Wild Eagle Lodge. The Wild Eagle Lodge will make every effort to accommodate this event. If you desire, other lodging is also available in the general area.

Mount Dora is a quaint town about 50 minutes north of Orlando. A brochure describes it as Florida's only mountain top town. "On a hill-side overlooking Lake Dora, blooms the friendly village of Mount Dora. A place where neighborhood hospitality lingers and the charm of old Florida is a way of life, Mount Dora is home to over 10,000 residents with always room for one more. Many call it the New England of the South." In my perspective, the area has more of a feeling of being up north Wisconsin rather than in Florida. The brochure goes on to say, "Much of the architecture in Mount Dora depicts a style reminiscent of the Victorian period. Visitors and residents enjoy a host of antique shoppes, boutiques, outdoor cafes and gourmet restaurants. A stroll down through town is a step back in time. Various popular events welcome visitors

with a love for art, antiques, crafts, cycling and more. With its rolling hillsides, tree-lined streets, and freshwater lake, Mount Dora's classic, small-town American charm is the ideal setting for one of the country's largest gatherings of antique boat aficionados."

Spring Tech Seminar.

This April, on a cool Saturday morning, numerous Blackhawk members made the journey to Ted and Cindy's place. Master technician Ted presented a well thought out workshop on fuel systems, from tank to carb.

The workshop actually began with the fuel filler to the tank. A very interesting safety issue was taught to us. How many of you are aware that the flexible rubber filler neck has a grounding strap from the metal cap to the tank? These grounding straps often become corroded and no longer carry a ground. A small spark, and it can be all over for someone. Ted carefully showed us some good examples, and explained the grounding of the whole system, as when one is filling their tank, this is the most likely place for the first spark to occur.



From there, we learned about the many different types of tanks—how they are cleaned, maintained, and the numerous vents and fill tubes. We discussed in great length how these tanks can be reconditioned, how they are to be cleaned properly by professionals, and how to maintain them. One never realizes all the functions of what seems to be a simple tank.

Then we went on to fuel lines, fuel pumps, and the carburetors. A few members brought along some of their projects, and Ted helped explain the necessary repairs. We again discussed numerous safety issues with proper venting, and priming of the carbs. I was surprised to learn the many little things that can go wrong, and what one should watch out for. Leaking fuel is a very dangerous situation on any boat. Ted taught us all the critical safety concerns for these older fuel systems.

For lunch, Cindy served delicious barbecue ribs and great skewers of shrimp shish ka bob. We then discussed questions members had of Ted. At the conclusion, everyone received a Certificate of Graduation from another one of Ted's great workshops. Thank you Ted and Cindy!

Getting Young people interested in the Boat Hobby

Two hot topics of discussion at ACBS quarterly meetings, seminars and events are boat preservation vs restoration and how do we get new members interested in the hobby. I wish to share with you an opportunity to attract future wood boat enthusiasts.

Mary and I have gotten to know Jim and Diana Shotwell of Nescopeck, PA. They belong to the Chesapeake Bay Chapter of ACBS. They own a charter service restore boats and merchandise "Capt. Jim Shotwell's James Craft Kit Boats. Jim acquired the right to recreate the Chris-Craft Kit Boats of the 1950s and has named them James Craft. He has sold numerous kits, built a demonstration model and displayed it at events including the 30th Annual Meeting at Tan-Tar-A Resort in Missouri. He also had a set up in Mount Dora Florida this past March.



As reported in the Fall 2005 issue of the Rudder, Jim Shotwell has generously offered to donate five James Craft boat kits to ACBS. He has also offered to donate one additional kit per year. These kits are to be used by Chapters in their Youth Development activities.

Jim and the ACBS leadership believe the next wave of members must come from today's youth. This group of young kids don't remember nor did they grow up with triple cockpit runabouts. They do remember and see outboards. Jim's wish, and that of the ACBS is that chapters use these kit boats to promote youth activities.

If you know of a youth group like the Scouts or a YMCA group or other group that would be interested in building a boat, please call one of the Blackhawk officers. They will help make contact with ACBS to find a way to make a kit boat available as a project.

Tall Ships to Set Sail in Chicago

Highly Anticipated Majestic Sailing Vessels Return to Chicago

The Blackhawk Chapter of the Antique and Classic Boat Society has been asked by Tall Ships Chicago to supply a number of out antique boats for an on land display during their visit August 3-9 2006. The display will be in conjunction with the Antique Boat Museum of Clayton New York who will be exhibiting as well. This display will be in the park area located on the south side of the Chicago River between Columbus drive and Michigan Avenue. Ten tall ships will be there for the public to view and board. Our boats will be a backdrop to these majestic sailing vessels from around the world telling a story of maritime history. In addition 4 other tall ships will be on display at Navy Pier. In 2003 nearly two million people visited the Tall Ships Chicago event. Below is a description of the events from the Tall Ships Chicago Organization.

The City of Chicago announces the return of the largest Tall Ships festival in the Great Lakes, when majestic wind-powered vessels sail into Chicago this summer for Tall Ships Chicago 2006, August 3-9. The festival brings the vessels to the shores of Lake Michigan docking along the Chicago River, Navy Pier and DuSable Harbor, providing a display that will be reminiscent of the majestic lakefront of the 1800's.

Tall Ships Chicago 2006 celebrates Chicago's rich maritime history and new waterfront developments by bringing this spectacular array of ships to Chicago with its incomparable skyline as the backdrop. In 2003 nearly 2 million people participated in Tall Ships Chicago.

On Thursday, August 3, the festival kicks off with a breathtaking Parade of Sail, culminating in the ships docking in the three festival sites. Beginning Friday, August 4 through Wednesday, August 9, festival attendees will have the opportunity to board vessels to learn about the ships and experience the sailing life (vessels remain docked). Boarding hours are 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. See participating vessel listing on second page.

Before Tall Ships sail into Chicago this summer, boarding passes will go on sale online, beginning March 1. Individual wristbands, which serve as boarding passes for the vessels, can be purchased for \$11 online through www.tallshipschicago.net or by calling a Ticketweb call center (visit ticketweb.com for call center phone numbers). Access to the festival grounds along the Chicago River, DuSable Harbor and Navy Pier is free, but individual wristbands are required to board vessels. (Please note that not all vessels are available for boarding.) A separate wristband must be purchased for each day that boarding is available (August 4-9, 2006).

Costs are as follows:

Individual wristbands: \$11 per day in advance, \$12 on-site.

Group wristbands (for 20 or more people) are available in advance only: \$9 per person per day

Tall Ships Chicago 2006 is part of the American Sail Training Association's (ASTA) Tall Ships Challenge 2006, an annual series of sail training races, rallies, cruises and port festivals organized by ASTA in conjunction with host ports in the U.S. and Canada. During the 2006 Great Lakes Series, wind-powered ships will make their way along the St. Lawrence Seaway and stop at different ports along their way to Chicago's festival stop. Other festival stops include Cleveland, Ohio; Bay City, Michigan and Green Bay, Wisconsin. Participants have an opportunity to be sail trainees on many of these vessels between ports (visit the website for more information).

Tall Ships Chicago 2006 is presented by The City of Chicago, Mayor's Office of Special Events, Navy Pier and the Chicago Park District and sponsored in part by the Chicago Sun-Times, CBS 2 and American Airlines.

Thank you for attending, and I look forward to seeing all of you at our next event.



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
