"Prop Wash" the 1947 19' Agua Aircar was also in attendance. Owned and restored by club members Paul Miller and Peter Mueller, was the brainchild of Philip Christensen of Phelps, WI. When purchased, the boat came with a treasure of documentation of all kinds, giving us a detailed history of the boat. The boat was designed with an airplane engine and propeller for power. The boat is modeled after a WWII P-40 Warhawk fighter. AM Deering Engineering of Chicago drew up the plans after contact from Philip in response to a boat magazine ad. Philip went even further to have the boat patented; we have the original document. The boat was built by Hemming Larson of Menominee, MI and delivered in time for the Milwaukee Sentinel Sports Show in March of 1947.



The boat is powered by a Continental C-125 airplane engine like the original purchased by Philip in 1947 for \$854.53. The engine currently installed is less the 200 digits off the original engine's serial number. The boat dosn't currently function but it does look good.

"Northstar" owned by Steve Gerding, also in the show is a 1946 17' Century Utility powered by a Gray Marine flathead 6 believed to be the original power plant. The engine was restored in the early 1990's runs well throughout the power range, pulling water skiers last summer. 1946 was the first year pleasure boat were produced after World War II.



Larry and Linda Dryfhout brought out "Racy Lady" a 1927 22' Chris Craft Gentleman's Racer. She started life as a 1927 Chris Craft Cadet. The previous owner, Robert Kent, made the conversion to include a 526 Keith Black all aluminum twin turbo engine with a power glide transmission and Menkens Z drive.

"More Kids" the Youth Group's 1955 18' Morehouse Utility powered by a 1955 Chris Craft K engine also joined the list of boats. The boat was donated to the chapter by member Chris Cantwell and restored by Chris and his father and used together for many seasons. The hull is of cedar strip construction, very different from the typical utility/runabout of the day. The boat is owned by the Chapter and maintained, serviced and used by the chapter youth group.

"1958 Mercury Super Marathon Mark 78" Club member Mike Furibondo brought his super restored old Merc. 1958 was the first year they produced this in-line 6 cylinder motor and at the time, it was the most powerful outboard motor in the world. The term "Super Marathon" comes from Mercury's testing the motor at their secret test site in Florida. They ran two identical boats continuously, day and night, rain or shine. The refueling, driver changes, and even minor repairs to the boats were done while underway to assure the motors never stopped. They traveled 25,000 miles, or around the earth, at an average 30 mph.



Chicago Maritime Art Center STEM Activities at the Chicago Boat Show

CMAC hosted young visitors to the Chicago Boat Show. The booth included exhibits from Urban Rivers and their marine ecology work on the Chicago River as well as STEM activities such as mini boat-building platforms. Kids could learn about buoyancy and density by building a boat from a 12 inch square piece of foil, setting it afloat, and then slowly adding marbles to see how much weight their boat could bear. The competition was stiff and the winner managed to build a boat that held 24 marbles before finally sinking to the bottom!

JUDGING (seriously?) By Ted Cartner

I'm probably going to get some flak about this article, but remember this is just the opinion of one old guy, and I do welcome further discussion on the subject.

Every once in a while someone asks me about their judging score from an ACBS event, even though I don't think I know even one percent of what there is to know about our vintage boats.

Sometimes I'll agree the judges were right, sometimes think they were wrong, and often I just don't know. At one of the early ACBS annual Shows I was asked to judge Classic Utilities, much to my surprise I was assigned to judge Antique Runabouts over 25 feet. I was way over my head at that one. I don't think I'll do any more ACBS judging due to the inherent inconsistencies of the system.

Let's imagine this scenario. You've brought your 1939 Chris Craft to a judged show and are eager for the results. Along with your boat there are another half dozen Chris Crafts and a couple of Garwoods in your class. But there in the slip next to you is a beautiful boat, there with its perfect varnish and exquisite upholstery is probably the best 1938 Famocraft in existence. Never heard of a Famocraft? Well guess what, neither have the judges. The judges are climbing all over this boat and everything is in excellent condition and of the 1938 era. But they have no idea what might not be original or what may be missing. So how can they honestly deduct points? At the end of the day the Famocraft gets the highest points and the top honors. Is this fair?

At one time the judging allowed for items that may be different then when the boat was built as long as it was a factory replacement. But now the benchmark for what is acceptable is "did it come from the factory that way". But there are many exceptions to that rule and different judges have different exceptions. Let's consider a very obvious exception. How many points should be deducted for that beautiful gold leaf name on the transom? Did the Chris Craft factory put it there? Most likely not. Then again, some judges take off points for something just in the boat and not even part of the boat. Should points be deducted for a cell phone in the side pocket, spare light bulbs, or spare battery? It's happened.

Recently there was a major change to the categories. There is now a division as to whether a boat is "restored" or "preserved". A preserved boat is one that maintains 60% of its' deck and topside material. It seems to me that the choice of which division the boat is in is up to the owner to arbitrarily choose how he wants to be judged. Have you ever seen the judges pull out their measuring tapes and carefully calculate the total square inches of the deck and topsides to compare it to the square inches of what may or may not be replacement material?

Take a brief look at one small area of inspection, the Model K engine, Chris Craft built tens of thousands of these and they had many changes over the years. When did they change from using the Hercules QXC block in favor of the QXD block? When did they switch from 24 head studs to 22? With what engine number did they change from the early thin head, which was prone to cracking, to the more reliable thicker cylinder head? When did the oil cooler become standard equipment? Did the early Ks have just two different length spark plug wires or just the replacements as listed in the 13th edition of the parts book? For that matter when did they change to 5 different lengths, then to 3 different lengths?



What about the Rajah bare spark plug terminals used in almost all restorations today? The original Rajah SR-11 terminal has not been available for a long time. The OD on the replacement split ring tongue terminal is about 5/64" larger than what was original, not much, but not original. Page through the various Chris Craft Model K parts books. You'll find spark plugs listed as J8, J8J, J8JRed Line, J8JM, and UJ6M. Which one is correct for your engine? When did the boats start being delivered with the 100 HP version vs the 95HP?



Oil cans, anchor, tools, hand pump, etc.

I've had the opportunity to research a few Chris Craft models at the Mariners Museum. After going through almost a thousand hull cards I can tell you there are many variances among the same model. Different upholstery colors, extra gauges, a spare prop, etc. I noted that sometimes, for whatever reason, a boat would be shipped missing some items such as part of their deck hardware. Many Chris Crafts were shipped with an extra can of "DUPLEX" engine oil (unopened), without looking at the hull card, how would you know which ones were? How many judges consult the hull card of every Chris Craft being judged?





I could go on for pages, but you get the idea. Judges are volunteers, not all are equally qualified, but they do the best they can. The ACBS judging system is not perfect, it never will be, in fact it is deeply flawed, because these facts and the answers to these questions, and hundreds more, are simply not common knowledge. Take pride in your boat, enjoy the pleasure it brings, and the opportunity to commiserate with folks of like mind. If high points are your goal, do the best you can. Just don't take it too seriously.
