


The Chicago River Rendezvous was a success!

First, a big thank you to the ACBS Blackhawk Chapter's organizers working with Chicago Electric Boat to put this event together and make it happen.

The weather was sunny and pleasant on the Chicago Riverwalk making the location ideal for exposure to the public as they strolled by admiring our bristol boats. The backdrop for our boats this year was the majestic Chicago skyline carved out by the sparkling Chicago River with our boats floating like gems for the city to appreciate. We had a turn out of about a dozen or so boats ranging in sizes from 57' to 14'.

Old Boats and Keeping Your Brain Young Engaging in Purposeful & Meaningful Activities

The 3 pound gelatinous blob between our ears holding 100 trillion synaptic connections also happens to be where the essence of who we are exists. This is where our likes and dislikes reside and where decision making occurs. This is even where for example we conjure the wild idea to purchase and restore a vintage boat.... or two. The human brain is by far the most important organ in the body, and it runs on a "if you don't use it you lose it" principle. This is why keeping our brain active with reduced stressors is even more important as we progress through life.

Everyone knows someone who has been impacted by dementia as approximately 1 out of 4 individuals over the age of 80 develop dementia. However, as a neuropsychologist I also meet a lot of individuals over 80 who are may be considered "super agers." These are people who manage to age well. They manage to thrive physically, cognitively and emotionally. Some of my patients have even participated in the SuperAging Research Program which looks to identify genetic, lifestyle and brain factors that contribute to exceptional memory. Super agers are relatively rare, with some estimates suggesting that they make up less than 10% of the population. They have a thicker brain cortex and they have a slower rate of brain shrinkage with age than their peers.

Do I believe as a neuropsychologist that participating actively in the ACBS might be conducive as a lifestyle factor that may help you thrive into older age? I do (this is the part of the article you show to your spouse who might be a bit reluctant to go to that vintage boat festival). This rash statement will be bolstered because I believe that several factors which are crucial for brain health can be found within the antique boating community such as a sense of community, cognitive engagement, physical work, and meaningful activity.

There are 4 pillars of cognitive health which are good guideposts for us at any age to focus on if we wish to reap the benefits of brain health well into our years of retirement.

These four pillars of brain health:

- I. Engaging in meaningful activities
- II. Psychological Well-Being
- III. Social Connectedness
- IV. Physical Health

All of these points can be met in part through the one hobby that holds the ACBS community together. Besides being an avid member of the boating community, I am also a Johns Hopkins trained neuropsychologist specializing in dementias. I will share a 4- part series discussing each pillar in the consecutive quarterly publications of the Smoke Signal. We will start with -Purposeful and Meaningful Activities.

To hammer the point home: Imagine a bristol 1936 35ft Double Cabin all Mahogany wood Chris Craft, with meticulous brightwork, gleaming on the water all summer and cruising through the channels, drawing smiles and awe because of her beauty and grace only to be hauled out to a warm and cozy heated winter storage. The intention of protecting the integrity of the boat for the winter seems like a solid idea. No projects planned, just a cozy heated condominium for the Chris Craft to rest her weary bones. What might be some of the consequences for this vintage vessel?

The cracks could begin to show where the wood is expanding and contracting. What was a tight joint between wood would shrink like a dish sponge drying out. Our well-intentioned rest for this venerable vessel might unleash a cascade of unintended consequences.

Following postdoc at Johns Hopkins I returned home to Chicago and was running a Memory Care Clinic. I began working with a patient, let's call him Mike, who was recently retired from an illustrious career with a high level position in International Maritime Law. After spending decades traveling to and from and wearing the burden of frequent flier programs as a badge of honor, this gentleman retired proudly approaching the age of 70 years old. Without admitting it to himself or to others around him the decades on the road took their toll on his health. Retirement was a relished idea. Yet, his sense of understanding of who he was very connected to the work that he did throughout his life. Now that he was not defined solely by work questions popped up such as 'what would he do" and "what would he be?" The idea of relaxing and enjoying this downtime seemed like enough of a plan. Mike awkwardly descended into his fluffy couch after clearing out those boxes from his desk at work. There was indeed a sense of relief for not needing to awaken at 5am for flights but there was also a sense that the days were melting into one another. A Monday could not always be differentiated from a Thursday.

He felt that retiring, instead of ushering in well-deserved freedom, ushered in a sense of floating into the abyss. This was an unintended side effect of retirement and not protective and restorative at all. Instead, the slowing down was quite deleterious to Mike's brain.

Just like that vintage 1936 35ft Chris Craft placed in a warm winter storage condominium getting rest, relaxation and an abatement of activity, Mike's lack of sense of purpose contributed to a cascade of events that decreased his optimal functioning and in fact shrunk his world and his mind. Similar to that dried out sponge analogy describing the wood seams on the vintage vessel, Mike's brain began to "shrink", and this is what we call "atrophy."

We all need to wake up with a sense of purpose – whatever that means to us personally. For many, throughout our lives that sense of purpose involves work and having a role in life that transcends ourselves. Once that ends due to the natural evolution of life and with the commencement of retirement we still need to find something that propels us out of bed in the morning.

It is important to ask ourselves "What brings you a sense of purpose?" The antique and classic boat society perfectly encapsulates that sense of purpose. To wake up knowing that there is a project, there is a community and there is a beautiful boat waiting there for you to make it come to life is priceless. It is enough knowing that your work sustains a sense of nostalgic past and provides defining experiences for your friends/family. This gives your year meaning as you plan to take your vintage boat out in the late Spring, as we experience a thaw after months of work behind the scenes. Keep this up! It is good for the brain and the spirit. Honestly, many of those reading this article already are far ahead of the curve on what it means to engage in purposeful and meaningful activities for brain health. You have found this niche and it extends throughout decades. Your brain thanks you for it and so do the boats. I look forward to revisiting more topics pertinent to Old Boats and keeping your brain young.

This summer, we were excited to bring in a group of dynamic instructors to lead our youth programming. Marcial Garcia Jr., from Little Village and currently an assistant teacher at Disney Magnet School, brings expertise in student and parent engagement. He recently welcomed a new daughter, Paola Marcellina, and will be completing his community service with us this fall, documenting curriculum and assisting with program planning.

Sean Reeser, a former Maryland park ranger with expertise in environmental issues and small craft water rescue, provided excellent safety management, especially for kids new to the water. He's also doing important campaign work for the Sierra Club this fall.

Rounding out the team was Jack Tarpy, a 16-year-old St. Ignatius High School crew member, who brought valuable rowing experience and worked closely with Marcial and Sean.



On Saturday the crowds start early, music plays all day, and the smiles on people's faces as they reminisce about these boats and there place in history, make it all worthwhile.












